




 The Brookline Meetinghouse is an important part of our community identity (and is worth saving as an historic landmark and emblem of our past).


2. The Town of Brookline needs additional year-round space to conduct Town business, such as committee meetings and public hearings. 54 responses




3. The Town of Brookline needs a gathering place available to the general public for events, community gatherings, and private functions. ⁵⁸ responses



4. The Town of Brookline needs a public space that is fully accessible to people with disabilities. ⁵⁶ responses




 The Town of Brookline would benefit from a public gathering space that includes a fully functional kitchen, dining area, and bathroom.





How likely would you be to attend the following events if they were held at the Brookline Meetinghouse? Check any that apply






